Gay-Friendly Laws Impact US Foster Care System

Over 100,000 American children who cannot live safely with their biological families wait in temporary foster care for a permanent adoptive family. Federal policies over the last decade have attempted to encourage adoption of these children, yet some states are enacting legislation to restrict the pool of prospective adoptive parents on the basis of sexual orientation. A recent report by doctoral students Sarah Kaye, and Katherine Kuvalanka from the University of Maryland's Department of Family Studies finds that state-level anti-gay adoption policies may not support Federal adoption priorities. In a national investigation, states with anti-gay adoption policies had 82% of foster children still waiting for adoption at year end, compared to 72% in states with gay-friendly policies. A foster child's chance of being successfully adopted from a state with gay-friendly adoption policies was twice that of a child being adopted from a state with anti-gay policies. Proponents of anti-gay adoption laws and policies often cite moral arguments or claim that these policies are in the best interests of children. However, social science has consistently demonstrated that children raised by lesbian and gay parents do not experience any developmental or psycho-social deficits as compared to children raised by heterosexual parents. In fact, there may be some unique, positive outcomes for children as a result of growing up with lesbian and gay parents, such as being tolerant, open-minded, and accepting of differences in others. The American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Psychological Association, the Child Welfare League of America, the North American Council on Adoptable Children and other important child welfare organizations have all issued statements affirming that lesbian and gay parents are just as likely to raise happy, well-adjusted children as heterosexual parents. Lesbians and gay men are also more willing than heterosexuals to adopt children, particularly hard-to-place children, including those with serious physical, emotional, and behavioral problems.

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Stay Healthy in the Heat

It may seem hard to believe, but even upstate New York gets hot enough during the summer months to pose some health risks. Children and the elderly are at the greatest risk of heat exhaustion. Some signs of heat exhaustion are nausea, vomiting, dizziness, paleness, cramps or an increased body temperature. By following a few simple steps, you can ensure that your family will have a really "cool" summer—even in the heat!

SOME SIMPLE WAYS TO PREVENT HEAT STRESS:

- Reduce strenuous physical activity as much as possible. Take frequent rest breaks (Stay in the shade during the hottest part of the day, 10 AM 4 PM).
- Drink plenty of water and offer water to the children frequently. Children can be dehydrated even before they ask for water. Pets need plenty of water too.
- Wear loose-fitting, lightweight clothing. Use sunscreen. Wear a wide brimmed hat and sunglasses to help block the sun.
- Pull the drapes or shades to keep the "cool" air in. If you are using fans to move the air around be sure they are out of reach of children.
- If you are around water remind the children about safe water play rules. Nothing takes the place of close supervision.
- Review the signs and symptoms of heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Your first-aid manual will help
 in determining what action to take. Be prepared to call for medical advice or immediate help if
 necessary.

Gay-Friendly Laws Impact US Foster Care System (cont.)

Currently eleven states--California, Connecticut, Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Vermont--and the District of Columbia currently have "gay-friendly" adoption laws, statutes, and/or high-court decisions which guarantee gay and lesbian individuals the opportunity to be considered as prospective adoptive parents. Five states--Florida, Michigan, Mississippi, Nebraska, and Utah--have "anti-gay" adoption laws or policies that prohibit or restrict adoption by gay and lesbian individuals or couples.

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Equality and Justice Day 2006

Monday May 8th was an exciting and inspiring day in Albany! Nearly 600 people attended this annual day of advocacy for LGBT civil rights at the New York State Convention Center in Albany. The event was masterfully organized by the Empire State Pride Agenda and featured hundreds of individual constituent meetings with state legislators, prominent speakers such as the Attorney General, Assembly Speaker, Senate Minority Leader, and Senate Majority Leader (this was apparently the first time Joe Bruno had ever addressed a gay crowd), plus two openly-gay members of the State Assembly, Deborah Glick and Danny O'Donnell (yes, that's Rosie's brother). As usual Carmen Vasquez, Deputy Director of Pride Agenda, spoke eloquently about our purpose.

The event was both a celebration of our successes and a call to lawmakers to support the LGBT community in a variety of ways: first, by adopting policies that provide full family and marriage equality to LGBT people; second, by passing legislation to make schools and the juvenile justice system safe for LGBT youth; and third, by adopting a Gender Non-Discrimination Act (GENDA), since SONDA, the statewide non-discrimination law, does not cover gender expression and transgender people.

The Lesbian and Gay Family Building Project was a cosponsor again this year. We exhibited at the event and spoke to dozens of activists and allies from around the state about our work. In addition, our families were well

represented on the slide show of images that ran on the big screen throughout the day.

Pride and Joy Families member Orla, pictured here with Linda, visited her state legislators, along with her mom Jackie. She gave each one her school picture and an autobiographical statement that said, "There are lots of different kinds of families. My name is Orla. I am seven years old. I live in Syracuse with my Mom, and I see my Matoo on some weekends. My Matoo is my other mom. The best part of being in my family is being loved. My favorite tradition is having M&M pancakes on birthdays." Congratulations and thank you Orla, for



spending your day in Albany speaking out for all of our families! We know that your presence made a difference.
