"Out" in the World: Advocating for Our Families at School and in Our Communities (Watson Room) with panelists Jackie Kelly, Ari Istar Lev, Jason Hungerford and Jason Seymour; Monique George will facilitate

This workshop will give participants a chance to hear first-hand the experiences of LGBT families advocating for equality and justice in our different communities, such as school districts and local towns and cities. Advocating for our families is essential in order to educate people about how our lives are affected by public policies and laws. Various tools of advocacy will be discussed, from working with school personnel, to lawsuits and legislative advocacy. Panelists will emphasize the small and "doable" conversations that every family should have in order to educate people about our families and our realities, the most successful method for creating allies and winning equality. Facilitated by the Empire State Pride Agenda, this panel workshop will energize and empower participants to take the necessary, concrete steps everyday to advocate for their families.

Gay Fatherhood (Link Room)

with Vince Sgambati

This session will not include an "expert" presentation; all participants are the experts. It will, however, provide gay and transgender fathers with an opportunity to come together and examine how, on a daily basis, we commit a very radical act by transcending a mother/father dichotomy, "mother" traditionally elevated as the nurturing - more essential parent. We will share our success and our challenges. Ultimately, under the guidance of a facilitator, participants will, as author Mary Pipher urges, form community in *The Shelter of Each Other*.

Maybe Baby: The Top Ten Things LGBT Prospective Parents (and Parents) Need to Know (Kilmer Room)

This interactive workshop will provide participants with an opportunity to pick up a few tips that will be useful on their journey through LGBT Parenthood. In lighthearted top ten list form, this session will give a brief overview on topics which include family building options, taking care of your relationships, and how our families are the same and different from other families. Perfect for parents-to-be, but experienced parents will learn something too.

Writing Workshop (Conference Room 301)

How Queer: Diversity within the LGBT Parenting Community (Watson Room)

with Ari Istar Lev

LGBT families represent diversity across many different communities. Many of our families are not only headed by same-sex parents, but are also interracial or transracial. Some of our families are formed by alternative means of conception, surrogacy and adoption and foster parenting have become increasingly common in the LGBT community. Some of us are step parenting older children, some of us are single parenting multiples, and some of our children have more than two queer parents. Transgender and transsexual parents clearly cross societal boundaries regarding gender and sex, and many same-sex parented families celebrate diverse gender expressions. This is an opportunity for all of us -- minorities within larger minorities -- to discuss our diverse families, and brainstorm strategies for successful queer parenting.

Same Sex Families and New York State Law (Link Room)

The purpose of this workshop will be to review several key components same sex families encounter as they navigate through the laws and court systems of New York State. Topics will include the current status of marital laws as they apply to same sex couples, the legal status of same sex legal custody and support and, laws affecting the dissolution of same sex relationships.

Talking to Children about Their Families (Watson Room)

At a young age, children start to notice that their families are different, but they do not realize that this difference can translate into anger, hostility, oppression, or become the focus of a national debate about whether their parents are "fit" to rear them. We need to engage our children in honest and thoughtful conversations about LGBT families, that assist them in developing pride, but equally important, they need to develop language and skills to combat the judgments they will undoubtedly experience. This workshop will help discuss age-appropriate ways to talk about LGBT families, and become not only advocates for our children, but teach them to become advocates for their families.

Transracial/Transcultural Families (Link Room)

with Roxanne L. Hill

This workshop will challenge workshop participants to move beyond the political correctness of most cultural sensitivity training to a deeper appreciation for the complexity of family life when members of the queer community establish families. Using a group facilitation format, race, class, gender, as well as sexual orientation will be explored. These dimensions of diversity profoundly inform who constitutes family in our society and the support received, stress, and coping skills necessary when two members of the community come together as family.

Building Families through Pregnancy: Donor Insemination, Fertility Challenges (Kilmer Room) with Dr. James D. Kondrup

Dr. Kondrup will review the current practices in donor insemination and provide an overview of common clinical situations that can impact the success of the donor insemination process.

General Session: Teen/Adult Kids Panel

Everyone is welcome to attend this general session during which teenaged and adult children of LGBT families share their family stories and respond to questions from the audience. The program is modeled on the COLAGE Teen Panel, an event held each year as part of Family Week in Provincetown, MA. Roxanne L. Hill, Ph.D., is a family therapist, trainer and consultant employed by the Center for Community Alternatives in Syracuse, New York. Roxanne holds a Bachelor of Science in Child Development and Family Relationships from Delaware State University, a Masters of Family Therapy from Southern Connecticut State University and received her doctoral degree in marriage and family therapy from Syracuse University in 2004. She has extensive experience in public education working with a predominantly 'at risk' inner-city population and currently conducts workshops in the Syracuse community for non-profit agencies on topics such as cultural diversity, youth development, African American Youth & Families, and issues concerning historically oppressed populations. Roxanne was a presenter for In The Family, a magazine for queer people and their loved ones, during its annual conferences for four consecutive years. She is a current board member of the Central New York Association of Marriage & Family Therapy, and a member of the Onondaga County Community Sexual Trauma Task Force.

Jason Hungerford, 28, along with his partner of nearly eight years, Jason Seymour, 28, are plaintiffs in the "Ithaca 50" marriage equality lawsuit. Their case was recently heard before the Third Judicial Appellate Court in Albany. Jason Hungerford, originally from the Northern Virginia/Washington, D.C. area, and Jason Seymour, originally from Wisconsin, decided to make central New York their new home and moved to Ithaca in 2002. Jason Hungerford currently works as an independent Internet technology consultant, and has developed a wide variety of web-based applications for many major corporations, as well as small businesses, associations, and community groups. Jason Seymour works as a Systems Engineer at Cornell University. "The Jasons" have been actively involved in various non-profit organizations and both have an intense entrepreneurial spirit, usually centered around technology. Both "Jasons" are on the Board of the Ithaca Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Task Force (ILGBTTF), and Jason Hungerford was elected co-Chair in October. In March, Jason and Jason attended the first Empire State Pride Agenda marriage equality training workshop in New York City, and now serve as Empire State Pride Agenda "Marriage Ambassadors".

<u>Jackie Kelly</u>, RN, BC, MSN, PNP, holds a Bachelor of Science in Health Science from Cortland College, and a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Binghamton University. She is board certified in pediatrics through ANCC, and has experience in human services, health education, and pediatrics. She earned a Master of Science in Nursing, as well as a Post-Masters Certificate in Nursing Education from Upstate Medical University, Syracuse. She currently works as a school nurse in an urban middle school. She is the lesbian mom of a delightful six year old girl.

James D. Kondrup, MD, provides infertility evaluation and treatment to many upstate New York women and their partners. He was trained at the Upstate Medical Center in Syracuse and went on to a residency at a Yale University affiliated hospital in Connecticut. He began his practice in the Binghamton area and in 1992 dedicated his clinical efforts to infertility and specialized surgeries. He is a member of many national organizations including the American Society of Reproductive Medicine and the Accreditation Council on Gynecological Endoscopy. In addition to his clinical practice, Dr. Kondrup is Assistant Clinical Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the Upstate Medical College in Syracuse NY.

Ari Istar Lev, LCSW, CASAC, is a therapist specializing in working with LGBT families at Choices Counseling and Consulting in Albany, New York (www.choicesconsulting.com). She is the author of *The Complete Lesbian and Gay Parenting Guide* (Penguin Press, 2004) and *Transgender Emergence: Therapeutic Guidelines for Working with Gender-Variant People and their Families* (Haworth Press, 2004). She is also a Board Member of the Family Pride Coalition and authors two syndicated national columns on LGBT families.

<u>Lisa D. Maynard</u> is the founder and director of Adoption Resource Network in Rochester, NY, which has recently merged with Hillside Children's Center. An adoptive parent of two children born in Korea, Lisa has personal and professional experience with a wide range of adoption-related issues. She has worked in adoption since the arrival of her children eighteen years ago.

Alenna McDonald began teaching and creating Yoga programs over 25 years ago in her preschool and kindergarten classes in New Orleans, Louisiana. She observed how the style and pace of a Yoga class was able to address the natural interests, needs and rhythms of children by simply inviting them to play and learn. Her work as an HIV Prevention Specialist with youth has taken her from San Francisco to Boston and back to her hometown of New York City. After attending Saint Ann's School in Brooklyn Heights she continued on to Smith College where she designed her own major in Women's Health and became active in various organizations on campus. She was the president of the Smith College Smithereens, the second oldest a capella group on campus. She also helped found Illmatics, a Hip-Hop Collective dedicated to racial and socio-economic education. She is currently writing a book on women's sexuality and the power therein. She is now living with her partner, Cheri, in Manhattan's Union Square

Born in 1981, Ry Russo-Young grew up in Greenwich Village with her sister and lesbian mothers. She attended Saint Ann's school in Brooklyn Heights as a child and went on to study Visual Art and Cinema Studies at Oberlin College. One of the early donor inseminated children, Ry has discussed her experience growing up in a gay household throughout her childhood. Over the years, Ry has tried to channel this experience creatively into her films and videos. In 2003, Ry wrote, directed and starred in BABES IN TOYLAND, which has screened at the Torino Film Festival in Italy as well as other festivals in Europe and the United States. Her other short film, MARION (2005) won a "Silver Hugo" award at this year's International Chicago Film Festival. She has recently finished her first feature film, ORPHANS, that she wrote and directed in early 2005. Her films are ripe with a new take on gender, relationships and humanity.

Dave Ruston is a gay dad and clinical social worker who works in schools with kids.

<u>Vince Sgambati</u> has trained educators and other human service employees to be skilled facilitators at state and local levels. He has also facilitated planning sessions, short term and long term, helping agencies, including school districts, individual schools and other educational, human service or health related programs, to articulate strategic plans including missions, objectives, overarching goals and short term strategies. More relevant to the needs of this conference, Vince has facilitated discussion groups around topics including but not limited to: diversity, collaboration, generating and prioritizing critical issues, literature studies and writing. Vince and his partner Jack, of 30 years, are the parents of a 9 year-old child.

<u>Dara Silberstein, JD, PhD</u>, is Executive Director of Women's Studies at Binghamton University. Prior to that she served as Staff Attorney for Broome Legal Assistance Corporation. Her areas of specialization include Women's Legal History; Feminist Jurisprudence; Queer Legal Theory, Constitutional Law (including its history and doctrinal development); The State, Power and the Law (including an examination of the legal doctrines in conceptualizing state authority and the individual rights of citizens within the United States); Labor Relations and the State (including a legal history of unionization and union democracy in the United States).

Barbara directs the music program at the Susquehanna School and teaches in her private recorder studios in Binghamton and Ithaca.
